**DIRECTOR OF REVENUE RETIRES**

For more than 45 years, he was known in the halls of Saint Louis County

Government simply as "Pete."

Director of Revenue Robert H. "Pete" Peterson retired on February 1, 2005.

The year was 1959. Alaska and Hawaii were admitted as new states. President Dwight D. Eisenhower and Vice President Richard M. Nixon occupied the White House. The Barbie doll debuted and Ford Motor Company discontinued the Edsel. Four-year-old Bill Gates watched the first episode of Bonanza on a black-and-white television and Pete Peterson began working in the Department of Revenue.

"The operation of the Department of Revenue was completely different then. Everything was done manually on ledger cards. We used a lot of pencils and a lot of erasers," Pete said.

Those first hours on a morning in 1959 became a day.

"Of course, I was a young guy and I didn't know anything then. Some of the old-timers, people in their thirties, showed me how to do things and really treated me nice – that is what I remember the most," he said.

That day merged into several days and then a week.

"I just kept showing up and learned a little bit more every day."

The week turned into a month and several more months formed a year.

"At sometime, you have to decide what you want to do with your life – what you have that you can contribute to others. Then, it really becomes a lifetime project," he said.

Pete decided that he had something to contribute to the Department of Revenue and to the citizens of Saint Louis County.

## Your County Government

### This issue's feature takes a look at the County Auditor's Office

Most people are familiar with the work and responsibilities of the State of Missouri Auditor's Office. Missouri Statutes provide for First Class Charter counties to appoint a County Auditor. In First Class counties, the County Auditor is responsible for the auditing role that the State Auditor's Office has for State of Missouri Departments and Non-First Class Missouri Counties.

The County Auditor's Office serves as an internal auditor for the County's operations. The term "internal auditor" basically means that the County Auditor performs the function of reviewing the internal operations of St. Louis County Government. These reviews involve evaluating financial information for appropriateness and accuracy, verifying compliance with regulatory and statute requirements and assisting in identifying operational improvements in County operations. The Office seeks to provide an independent and objective analysis and appraisal of County operations.

The County Auditor's Office reports to the County Council. This reporting structure is for the purpose of providing a high level of independence from County management, which fosters objective analysis.

In 2002, the County Council leadership made the decision to refocus the efforts of the County Auditor's Office. The current County Auditor, **MARK BURCHYETT**, was appointed in March 2002 with the directive to restructure the County Auditor's Office operations to function as a professional internal audit office, mirroring internal audit functions found in most public/private corporations and large local governments. Over the past two years, the County Auditor's Office has implemented professionally-based audit work standards and reporting mechanisms, staffed the office with personnel focused solely on conducting internal audits, worked to educate County personnel and management on the new internal audit approaches, and build

relationships with County Government necessary to perform quality reviews.

From the feedback the County Auditor's Office has received from the County Council, County Executive's Office, County management and personnel, it appears that the restructuring process has been a success and has

improved the level of control awareness within County Government. Though the County Auditor's Office has a long way to go before it attains the level of service that is needed for an entity the size of St. Louis County Government, steps are being made in the right direction through the support of the County Council and County Executive's Office. By the end of 2005, the County Auditor's Office will have conducted at least one audit in every County Department.

The County Auditor's Office implemented a confidential hotline in 2003. The hotline provides an avenue for citizens, including county employees, to report suspected financial improprieties, waste of public funds or resources, and / or constructive suggestions for improving County Government. The hotline is operated by the County Auditor's Office, and access to the messages is limited to individuals specifically authorized by the County Auditor. Calls to the hotline are anonymous; caller ID is not used. The hotline number is 314-615-7000. Visit the County Auditor's Intranet web site for information on the hotline.

Prior to being appointed the Director of Revenue in February of 2004, Pete served as the Acting Director since October of 2002. Pete's more than 45 years of service with the Department of Revenue included 11 years as a Draftsman, 18 years as a Map & Automation Supervisor, 14 years as the Collector of Revenue and more than two years during two separate appointments as Acting Director of Revenue.

Pete's accomplishments included designing a new school sub code (tax rate) system – the forerunner to the Master Address Directory; designing and implementing the first online personal property system; coordinating the development of the reassessment plan for Saint Louis County; developing a new online mapping graphic system; and assisting in migrating to a new Integrated Assessment System. As Director, Pete managed the more than 260 employees in the Department of Revenue.

With all of the changes during the last 45 years, Pete said that one part of the job remained the same. "Through the years my co-workers have always meant more to me than just a resource to be trained to do a job. You work so close together that the workplace becomes like a home. The little things make a big difference. You have to develop the simple comforts to make people feel at home. When you do that, your co-workers appreciate it and you don't have to ask them to work – they want to contribute," he said.

Through the years, many co-workers have told Pete that they remember the little things that he did for them. "I don't even

remember doing some of the things that people say that I did for them. It just seemed like the right thing to do. It must have meant a lot to them at the time for them to remember years later."

It wasn't just the people he worked with, but it was the people that he worked for that were important to Pete. "My goal was to let every customer know: 'I work for you.' No one is happy about paying taxes, but they should know that we are here to serve them."

During a retirement celebration on January 26 to honor Pete, County Executive **CHARLIE A. DOOLEY** presented a proclamation to him which read in part:

"Whereas, while his accomplishments will be difficult to equal, his legacy will inspire us all for many years to come. Now, therefore I, Charlie A. Dooley, County Executive, Saint Louis County, Missouri, do hereby proclaim, the years of 1959 until 2005 as the Robert H. "Pete" Peterson Era in Saint Louis County."

That first year of employment back in 1959 became another and then another. After working for Saint Louis County for more than 45 years, Pete has no doubt what he will miss the most during his retirement. "Leaving a group of such good co-workers and friends after 45 years fills me with a mixture of nostalgia and appreciation. I am going to miss them," he said. There will be many people in the halls of Saint Louis County Government that will miss him too.

**County Employees Asked About their Health**

County employees are encouraged to participate in an exciting project administered by the Department of Health (DOH).

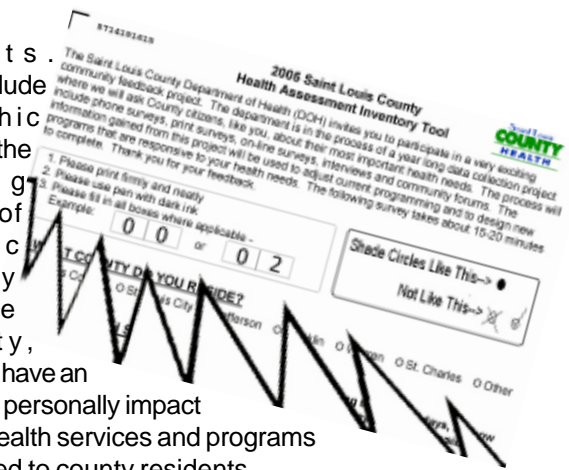
The DOH is preparing to conduct its first-ever countywide health needs assessment. Through a grant from the Missouri Foundation for Health, DOH will solicit input from thousands of county residents concerning their health status and preventative health behaviors that are related to leading causes of morbidity and mortality. The assessment will be distributed by phone, mail and the Internet through the end of June.

"This assessment is fundamental in determining the specific needs of the county and will assist the DOH in program planning and intervention to improve health outcomes in our community," said Director of Research, **LAURA PUZNIAK**, PhD, MPH.

The project began after an annual review of health indicators revealed several possible changes in the health needs of county

residents. Examples include demographic changes and the growing incidence of chronic disease. By surveying the community, individuals will have an opportunity to personally impact the types of health services and programs that are offered to county residents

# Department Notes



## Highways & Traffic

**NEW DEPARTMENT DIRECTOR** - With his appointment late last year to the Acting Directorship of Highways and Traffic, **GARRY EARLS** is now leading two key County departments. A retired United States Air Force colonel, Earls, an engineer, has been the Director of the Department of Public Works since April 1999 – a post he continues to hold as he oversees Highways and Traffic.

**LARRY BOLLINGER**, Survey Office Manager for the Department's Construction Division, received a lifetime achievement award from St. Louis's chapter of the Missouri Society of Professional Surveyors. Bollinger was recognized for his nearly 40-year career in surveying, during which he mentored many practicing land surveyors and distinguished himself as a scholar and educator in the field.

By early March, the Department's Snow Operations team had responded to nine major winter storms – a fairly typical number. In the process of keeping the Department's 3,000-plus lane miles of driving pavement clear of snow and ice, workers have used 6,920 tons of salt, 43,000 gallons of calcium and 25,500 gallons of brine.

## Public Works

In late January, at the direction of County Executive **CHARLIE A. DOOLEY**, a multi-phase reorganization was implemented to greatly streamline the process of obtaining a residential or commercial permit from Saint Louis County. The reorganization includes: 1) Merging the Plan Review & Permit Sections of Highways & Traffic and Public Works into one physical location, 2) Utilizing a new computer tracking system to monitor plan review responsiveness, 3) Expanding the functions of the County's Permit Application Center (PAC) and 4) Expanding the functions of County Government's Business Assistance Center (BAC) to encompass both commercial and residential projects.

## Parks & Recreation

**ROZIER AWARD** - The Missouri Alliance for Historic Preservation, the statewide advocacy group, honored St. Louis County's long-time commitment to the preservation of historic buildings by giving their Elizabeth and George Rozier Award to the County's preservation historian, **ESLEY HAMILTON**. This award recognizes lifetime achievement and is considered the top preservation award in the state. Governor Matt Blunt presented the framed certificate at a ceremony in the rotunda of the State Capitol in Jefferson City on February 23.

**YEAR IN REVIEW** - In 2004, Parks staff continued our tradition of honoring notable accomplishments through awards that are nominated and selected by the employees themselves. ## Another Perfect Game





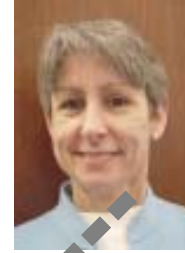
